



## FIELD TRIPS - May 2014, and beyond:

Hoped-for birds will be Dipper and Sooty Grouse, as well as Mountain Quail, Lark Sparrow, Golden Eagle, and the many beautiful and interesting breeding birds that call King Ridge their home. #### FIELD TRIP REPORTS:

**April 12<sup>th</sup>, the Mines Rd area** outside Livermore, Alameda County and ending Del Puerto Canyon Rd, Santa Clara and Stanislaus County. (Afterward, half the group went on to try for the Marsh Sandpiper but the wind was impossible and the bird wasn't present.)

Eleven eager birders were rewarded with a great day; nice and cool most of the day. Saw or heard 84 species, plus others en route. **Highlights:** Rick LeBaudour spotted our best birds at Del Valle Regional Park - LEWIS'S WOODPECKER on an oak near the top of the grade,

heading for the park kiosk entrance. Several GOLDEN EAGLEs soared above. At the bridge over the creek, there were WHITE-THROATED SWIFTS with the swallows, and a WOOD DUCK flew by. A flock of CEDAR WAXWINGS was going to creek and drinking. Several alternate plumaged EARED GREBEs were on the lake. Along Mines Rd had great looks at PHAINOPEPLAs at about milepost 8. Saw a mama deer with 2 adorable fawns. RUFOUS-CROWNED SPARROWs were present as well. At around milepost 12, we heard a ROADRUNNER cooing, but it was out of sight downslope (and about 2 dozen Harleys went by just then...) After lunch at The Junction, Rick had a LAWRENCE's GOLDFINCH flyover but never got good looks. On Del Puerto Canyon Rd at around 2 miles (Santa Clara County), there is a pond on the north side of the road. There is a colony of TRICOLORED BLACKBIRDS there - we counted around 30. Very noisy and a wonderful sight. RING-NECKED DUCKs were also on this pond. Further down the road, in Stanislaus County, we had great looks at CANYON and ROCK WRENs in a narrow rocky canyon. We only saw a very few Anna's Hummingbirds, and it was too early for some other species. We heard CALIFORNIA THRASHER in every county, but never saw one.

**April 26th, Pine Flat-** For the seven intrepid birders willing to risk the 7:30am meeting time, the Pine Flat Rd. field trip yielded a birding bounty. Among the highlights of the **58 species** seen were great views of BELL'S SPARROW, a lifer for three members of the group, PURPLE MARTIN, ASH-THROATED FLYCATCHER, OLIVE-SIDED FLYCATCHER, HAIRY WOODPECKER, PILEATED WOODPECKER and CALIFORNIA THRASHER. Brief vocals and glimpses of LAZULI BUNTING, and BLACK-THROATED GRAY WARBLER added more great birds to the list. MOUNTAIN QUAIL were heard, but not seen, as were ROUFOUS-CROWNED SPARROW and CASSIN'S VIREO. Participants were leader, Bill Doyle, Rick LeBaudour, David Hofmann, Ruth Rudesill, Elmarie Hutchinson, Denise Herzberg, and Norm Ortman.

## "PISHING with PARMETER" ROCK SANDPIPERS AT THE SONOMA COAST

On 2/24/68, while birding at Mussel Point, 4 Rock Sandpipers were seen in the company of Surfbirds and Black Turnstones. The Rock Sandpipers were in winter plumage. Later, on 2/12/69, 2 birds were seen at Mussel Point, again in winter plumage, with rockbirds. A single bird, in breeding plumage (showing black on the breast) appeared at the same spot on 4/19/69. The following fall, on 12/20/69, a single bird was at the Bodega Marine Lab, and a month later, on 1/10/70, 3 birds were present at Mussel Point. That same date a single bird was seen on the jetty at the entrance to Bodega Harbor (possibly 4 total birds).

The next fall, on 11/4/70, 3 birds showed up at Bodega Head, again in the company of Black Turnstones and Surfbirds (as almost seems the usual pattern). A single bird was noted at Bodega Head on 1/30/71. Nearly a year later, 12/18/71, 2 birds were seen at the Head. Again, on 3/5/72, 2 birds were present here. Over a year later, 12/8/73, 4 birds in winter plumage were at Bodega Head. On 1/2/74 2 birds were seen at Bodega Head, the Marine Lab, and Mussel Point. Probably some of those sightings were of the same individuals.

The following fall, 11/30/74, 2 birds were noted at Bodega Head, and 3 birds were present at this spot on 1/3/75. A single bird was recorded at the Marine Lab on 1/16/76. Two birds were noted at the Head on 1/8/77, and 3 were here on 3/30/77. On 12/31/78 one bird was found at Bodega Head (back for another year). Three birds were at the Head 2/11/79. Two birds were found 1/27/80, and 2 again on 12/26/80. The birds returned annually in the winter, with a high count of 4 birds on 1/18/81.

Other records include: 2/28/87 Kurt Campbell, 2/28/88 Rich Stallcup, and 12/2/96 Greg Jackson. Two more recent records: 11/23/03 Bodega Head, David Hofmann. This bird remained until 2/8/04. The last record is 1/18/10, a single bird on the jetty, Heather Cameron. All sightings are my own unless otherwise noted. I wish this species would return regularly to our area, and in numbers as previously seen. **Mike~**


