

<u>Directions to the monthly meeting:</u> From Hwy 101, take Hwy 116 West toward Sebastopol. Turn right (north) on Llano Rd. and go ~ 1 mile to **Laguna Wastewater**Treatment Plant at 4300 Llano Rd, Santa Rosa. Look for an open gate on right. Proceed to Administration Bldg. at SE corner of the plant. From Hwy. 12, take Llano Rd. south about 3 miles. Plant is on left.

<u>Dinner Before the monthly meeting:</u> This month, join us at **5:30pm** at the **Outback Steakhouse**, 4619 Redwood Dr., Rohnert Park. Take the Golf Course Exit from Highway 101. The restaurant is located at the north end of the Wal-Mart Center just west of Hwy 101.

FIELD TRIPS - Autumn 2014:

November 8, 2014, Saturday: Tolay Lake Regional Park. Meet to carpool at the boat launch lot just south of Papas at 8 AM. Proceed up Cannon Lane to the gate. Parking in the park requires annual pass or \$7 fee. We will hike about 5 miles on mostly level trails to sample the varied habitats of this Region Park in the making. Lots of raptors and sparrows in and over the grasslands; some nice ponds with possible American Bittern; oak woodland residents; Barn Owls in the barn; possible wintering Burrowing Owl. Andy Lacasse (763-5167) leads. Bring lunch and water. Heavy rains cancel.

November 22, 2014, Saturday: Gray Lodge State Wildlife Area and Sacramento National Wildlife Refuge. The winter flocks of ducks, geese, swans, cranes, and ibis as well as winter raptors should be in force. Meet at the entrance to Gray Lodge, on Almond Orchard-Pennington Rd. south from the Colusa Highway (6.5 miles w of Gridley), at 8:30 AM. It is approximately 2.5 hours from Santa Rosa via Clear Lake or from Petaluma via Vacaville. You might wish to spend Friday night at a motel in Yuba City/Marysville. Leader TBA. FIELD TRIP REPORT: September 30th, Outer Point Reyes

We had eleven enthusiastic birders with nice weather. Highlight for most was an adorable Long-tailed Weasel poking its head out of the rocks near the Chimney Rock trailhead. We had good looks at Peregrine Falcon, Rock and House Wren along the walk to the Lighthouse. We had great views of a Clay-colored Sparrow, Hermit Warbler, Palm Warbler, and Nashville Warbler at the Fish Docks. We had birds at the Mendoza trees but the light was bad there. Folks were seeing vireos which I never got on. Gordon Beebe took a picture and later confirmed that one of the vireos was a Philadelphia Vireo! 79 species total. **Ruthie**~

Rudolf O.F. Oppenheimer, MD, 12/22/1925 - 10/10/2014

In October of this year, RROS lost another of its founding members, Rudolf Oppenheimer. Dr. Oppenheimer came with his family to San Francisco, from Germany, during the Second World War. He attended Lowell HS in San Francisco, graduated from UC Berkeley, and from medical school at UCSF. He was trained as a surgeon at Yale, and completed his Urology training also at UCSF. During his medical training, he met and married Emily Knight, a violinist. In 1958, the Oppenheimers moved to Santa Rosa from the City, attracted to the rural beauty, and the active local symphony, of which Emily became a member. Dr. Oppenheimer was an active member of the Sonoma County birding community, and an enthusiastic founding and supporting member of RROS. For many years, he volunteered as a docent at Bouverie Audubon Preserve, and was a perennial contributor to Sonoma Land Trust, and many other conservationist and humanitarian organizations. He is survived by his wife, Emily, and extended family.




