<u>Directions to the DECEMBER meeting:</u> From Hwy 101, take Hwy 116 West toward Sebastopol. Turn right (north) on Llano Rd. and go ~ 1 mile to **Laguna Wastewater**Treatment Plant at 4300 Llano Rd, Santa Rosa. Look for an open gate on right. Proceed to Administration Bldg. at SE corner of the plant. From Hwy. 12, take Llano Rd. south about 3 miles. Plant is on left.

<u>Dinner Before the monthly meeting:</u> This month, join us at **5:30pm** at the **Outback Steakhouse**, 4619 Redwood Dr., Rohnert Park. Take the Golf Course Exit from Highway 101. The restaurant is located at the north end of the Wal-Mart Center just west of Hwy 101.

## FIELD TRIPS - Autumn 2014:

December 2014: Christmas Bird Counts. Santa Rosa, Sunday, December 14; Sonoma Valley, Friday, December 27; West Sonoma County Sunday, December 29.

January 10-11, Saturday and/or January 11, Sunday, 2015: January 10, Saturday: Walnut Grove/Thornton wintering waterfowl concentrations and the Consumnes River Reserve. Ken Wilson will lead. Meet at the junction of Stanly Road and State Highway 12/29 just south of Napa at 8 AM. We will then proceed through Fairfield on Highway 12 to State Highway 113, then north to Flannery Road to look for Mountain Plovers and Burrowing Owls. Then continue on Highway 12 to I-5, then north to Thornton (exit 493), then west to Staten Island Rd. where winter flocks of ducks, geese, swans, cranes, and ibis as well as winter raptors should be in force. Lunch at the Consumnes River Reserve north of Thornton. After lunch we will head north through Sacramento, then west to near Davis to watch for Short-eared Owls at sunset. If you have just one day free, you can head home from here on I-80. Otherwise, proceed north on State Highway 113 to Yuba City for the night. The Bonanza Inn in Yuba City is recommended. It might be a good idea to reserve a room early as it is hunting season. January 11, Sunday: Prime targets are the Gray Lodge State Wildlife Management Area and the Sacramento National Wildlife Refuge. Expect a rather different mix of species here than near Thornton. If you stayed the night in Yuba City, after an early breakfast we will leave from the Bonanza Inn to bird the base of the Sutter Buttes. Otherwise, plan to meet at the entrance to Gray Lodge, on Almond Orchard-Pennington Rd. south from the Colusa Highway (6.5 miles w of Gridley), at 9:30 AM. If you are coming from home direct, it is approximately 2.5 hours from Santa Rosa via Clear Lake or from Petaluma via Vacaville. Leader TBA. January 24, 2015, Saturday: Gulls of the Sonoma County coast. Meet at Bodega Bay at the large dirt lot along Bay Flat Rd. at Westshore Rd, at 8:00 am. We will check Bodega Bay, Bodega Head, Salmon Creek beach, and Goat Rock Beach (and points between) for roosting flocks of gulls (and other birds of interest). The usual suspects include (of all ages): Heermann's, Mew, Ring-billed, Western, California, Herring, Thayer's, Glaucous-winged, and maybe Bonaparte's, with the slim possibility of rarities such as Glaucous, Black-legged Kittiwake, Iceland, and/or Slaty-backed (but don't hold your breath), plus hybrids (aarrrgh!). There will be lots of non-gulls to look at also. Gene Hunn leads (enhunn323@comcast.net, 707-981-7301). Bring lunch or forage on route. Heavy rains cancel.

## FIELD TRIP REPORTS:

Tolay Lake RP, Saturday, November 8th: The field trip was ably led by Andy Lacasse. Though bone dry out there, the raptors put on a good show, especially the Peregrine and Prairie Falcons herding massive murmurations of starlings (several thousand strong). Also noted, a quick flyby by a Merlin, lots of American Kestrels, Red-shouldered and Red-tailed Hawks, two Ferruginous Hawks (an adult and an immature), and three Golden Eagles (two adults with a youngster, no doubt locally raised). A Varied Thrush posed for photographers in the oak woodland on the trail towards the East Peak. Steller's Jays at the headquarters reflected this species seasonal wanderings, much noted elsewhere this fall. A flock of 20 Long-billed Curlews had arrived for the winter, despite the drought. Lots of Loggerhead Shrikes (the local resident family), and Say's Phoebes. We failed to find Burrowing Owls but heard rumors of one elsewhere in the park. Access to this Regional Park property is restricted to those who have "qualified" for a pass (by attending an orientation session), or to organized groups.

Lynch Canyon and Rush Ranch, Saturday, November, 22<sup>nd</sup>: A small but hardy crew of birders joined our leader Dave Barry on an invigorating morning hike in Lynch Canyon Open Space Park (Solano County), with an afternoon extension to Rush Ranch Open Space off Grizzly Island Road. We persevered through the tail end of the morning's rain to enjoy clearing skies and broad views with lots of raptors drying and stretching their wings.

Lots of Red-tailed Hawks of all phases and ages, lots of Northern Harriers and American Kestrels similarly various, several White-tailed Kites, a single PEREGRINE, in hot pursuit of a duck, a soaring ROUGH-LEGGED HAWK (Lynch Canyon) and a distant FERRUGINOUS HAWK (over Rush Ranch). Perhaps the raptorial highlight was three GOLDEN EAGLES out hunting (two at Lynch Canyon, one at Rush Ranch). Also a Loggerhead Shrike, three Barn Owls (Rush Ranch), various sparrows, tons of meadowlarks, lots of Say's and Black Phoebes, and to top it off at least 100 Long-billed Curlews along Grizzly Island Road and a colony of at least half a dozen LEWIS'S WOODPECKERS and a pair of ROCK WRENS, both on the North Ridge at Lynch Canyon.

## Pishing with Parmeter~ The "Big" Big Day

On 4/30/83, I was part of a Big Day team with the objective to set a new North American Big Day record. The existing record number at that time was 235 in Texas. Our team consisted of Laurie Binford, Geri Langham, Don Roberson, John Parmeter, Roger Tory Peterson, and I. National Audubon sponsored us, putting us on a two engine plane, with a pilot at our disposal.

The count was to be completed within California. We started at midnight on the west side of the Colorado River at Yuma. Our first stop was at a place called West Pond where we got all the rails and several other species. By daybreak we had a list of about 25. We then flew to Salton Sea where, at the south end of the sea, we knew a spot to see Yellow-footed Gull. The pilot took the plane down to within a few hundred feet of land, banked at an island in

the sea, and the gull was visible to all. Then, we were on to Yucca Valley where a waiting vehicle took us to Big Morongo. I recall that at Big Morongo we were all gazing at a Hammond's Flycatcher when a photographer got in front of us and took a photo of our group. The flash caused temporary blindness for all of us. We next flew to Big Bear in the San Bernardino Mts. where we searched for mountain species. Then it was back in the plane for a flight to Monterey, where we spent the remainder of the day. We took in Point Pinos, Carmel River, and other known birding sites. I remember seeing Canada Goose (which was still a scarce bird then) by flashlight. We ended up in Upper Carmel Valley owling, where we got all the regular owls. Throughout the day, the count had been announced periodically. After owling, the count was 235. We had tied the record. Went to Monterey Pier where we hoped to see or hear a Black-crowned Night Heron, but no luck. 235 was the total count. I recollect my son, John, saying to me at midnight, "The day count is zero."

The next month there was an article in <u>Birding Magazine</u> by the Texas team which had seen 235 species. The article mentioned the team hearing a Groove-billed Ani across the Rio Grande River in Mexico (this was illegal according to ABA Big Day rules). The following month there were several letters to the editor of the magazine pointing out this error. Their count had to be reduced to 234. The succeeding month the magazine published a brief article declaring our team the holder of the U.S. Big Day record! **Mike**~


