

RROS General Meeting, February 11, 2015 7p.m., First United Methodist Church 1551 Montgomery Ave., Santa Rosa, CA Wednesday, February 11, 2015, 7p.m.: Samantha Arthur, Conservation Project Manager for Audubon, California, will discuss the work being done to further conservation of California's endangered, endemic Tricolored Blackbird.

<u>Save the Date:</u> Wednesday, March 11, 2015, 7p.m.- Dr. Andrea Goodnight, veterinarian at Knowland Park's California Condor Recovery Program, will tell us about the Condor recovery efforts at Oakland Zoo.

Directions to new monthly meeting: From Hwy 101, take the "Downtown" exit. Head east on 3rd St., through downtown, until it becomes Montgomery, after crossing Brookwood. Continue east on Montgomery, past Memorial Hospital. The meeting hall and parking lot is directly opposite Macklyn Ave, on Montgomery.

Dinner Before the monthly meeting: This month, join us at **5:30pm** at *Mary's Pizza*, at 535 Summerfield Rd, Santa Rosa, across from Howarth Park. From 101, take Hwy 12 east to Hoen Ave exit. Continue east on Hoen, to Summerfield, then north on Summerfield to the restaurant.

FIELD TRIPS - February 2015, and beyond:

Feb 14th, Saturday - Delta Pond, and Willowside Trail: Delta Pond in winter always holds interesting surprises. Bring your scopes, and meet at the south end of the bridge over Santa Rosa Crk, on Willowside Rd., 8:00am. Bill Doyle, leader. Heavy rain cancels.

Feb 27th, Friday - Sunday March 1st: Field Trip to Humboldt County with Ruthie Rudesill. Join us on real adventure to one of the best birding areas in California! Anyone who follows the county birding in California knows about the wonders of Humboldt County. Seems to be a magnet for rare birds and has local specialties as well.

I will be driving up early Friday morning and will meet the group at 10:30 at the Arcata Marsh Project Information Center (Take Hwy 101 to Samoa Blvd exit heading west and turn left on G street - follow the signs on the right) FYI: Arcata Marsh is off I Street. We will bird the area and possibly head north in the afternoon.

Several motels are found at the Guintoli Lane exit from Hwy 101 in northern Arcata. Turn right on Valley West Blvd. There is fast food and a coffee shop, groceries, and gas at the shopping center. Big news is Saturday: local expert Rob Fowler will lead us! He has given us a discount to his fees (\$20) each. I've asked him to take us to a Ruffed Grouse spot! And he will know of any rare birds sticking around and will strive for a well rounded Humboldt experience. We will meet at the coffee hut at the shopping center parking lot at 7:30 AM Saturday. Plenty of time to eat. Bring lunches.

Weather permitting, we will try for owls one night too. Sunday, we will bird our way south in redwoods, river bottoms and mountains. We may even find Bigfoot!!

March 11, 2015, Wednesday: San Pablo Bay shore sites. Restoration of key habitat along Sonoma County's San Pablo Bay coastline is underway. We have permission from the Sonoma Land Trust to survey their new wetland behind the dike off Reclamation Rd. Leader(s) TBA. There are large winter concentrations of waterfowl (including perhaps Barrow's Goldeneye), shorebirds, and raptors (maybe a Rough-legged Hawk or Short-eared Owl) to be pursued, plus flocks of sparrows (maybe Clay-colored) and other species of plowed fields (pipits, Horned Larks) and hedgerows (shrikes). We will meet at 8 AM at the Port of Sonoma Marina parking lot, to check the mouth of the Petaluma River, before

heading east to Reclamation Road, the Sonoma River bridge, and Hudeman Slough/Skaggs Island. Finish by 3 PM. Expect a fair bit of walking. Bring your lunch, dress for the weather. Heavy rain cancels. Leader to be announced.

Pishing with Parmeter~ "BIG DAYS" AT THE LAGUNA DE SANTA ROSA

In the early 1960s I was a resident physician at Sonoma County Hospital (now Community Hospital) on Chanate Road. I was already an ardent birder at that time, having started in the 1940s when my mother gave me a copy of Roger Tory Peterson's A Field Guide to Western Birds. I had previously met a Santa Rosa birder, Gordon L. Bolander, who had a reputation as an accomplished birder. I got in touch with him in 1960, and we remained fast birding companions until his death in 1977. Gordon lived at Timber Hill, which is located on the Laguna de Santa Rosa, immediately west and north of the bridge at Guerneville Road. His home was on the west side of the lagoon, with a porch on the east side of the house that overlooked the lagoon and the usually flooded field (in winter) just east of the lagoon. One of our favorite birding activities was to see how many species of birds we could identify in a 24 hour period in Sonoma County, or a portion thereof. This is called a "Big Day."

We began by sleeping on Gordon's porch, recording night birds: Screech Owl, Great Horned Owl, and Barn Owl were regulars. Virginia Rail and Sora called at night. Yellow-breasted Chats were still nesting in the area and called all night long. Immediately after arising, we headed down to the lagoon, and its riparian growth of alders and willows. California Thrashers were then nesting there, and were one of the first birds to sing a welcome to the morning. Song Sparrow called early in the day and, occasionally, at night. The list of birds in the riparian is lengthy, and includes Nuttall's Woodpecker, Downy Woodpecker, Oak Titmouse (then called plain Titmouse), Fox Sparrow, and occasional Chipping Sparrows. Yellow-rumped Warbler (then called Audubon's Warbler), Myrtle Warbler (now lumped with Yellow-rumped), and Ruby-crowned Kinglets were common in winter. Chestnut-backed Chickadees led small flocks, which included Bushtit, Bewick's Wren, and Hutton's Vireo.

Other species usually noted in this habitat were California Quail, Scrub Jay, Marsh Wren, Red-winged and Brewer's Blackbirds, Lincoln's, White-crowned, and Golden-crowned Sparrows, Belted Kingfisher, American Robin, Black Phoebe, Anna's Hummingbird, House Finch, American Goldfinch, Spotted Towhee (then Rufous-sided Towhee), and California Towhee (then Brown Towhee). The usual 5 species of swallows were present in summer; only Tree and Violet-green in winter. Pied-billed Grebe was found in deeper water. Red-breasted Sapucker, Wood Duck (easily noted by their squealing call), and Orange-crowned Warbler were regular in summer, and a few remained in winter. Townsend's Warbler was present in winter, Wilson's Warbler in summer. We always looked for Hermit Warbler and Black-throated Gray Warbler in winter, sometimes finding both.

In winter, after birding the immediate Laguna area, we returned to Gordon's porch to set up our spotting scopes to check the flooded field to the east. Mallard, Gadwall, Pintail, American Wigeon, Northern Shoveler, and Cinnamon Teal were observed, and, occasionally, a Blue-winged Teal. Bufflehead was common, along with Common Goldeneye and Ruddy Duck. Crows and Ravens were always present. Double-crested Cormorant, Great Blue Heron, Great Egret, and Snowy Egret were regular. Ring-necked Duck was often in the deeper water. Red-shouldered Hawk, White-tailed kite, Turkey Vulture (as the air warmed), Sharp-shinned and Cooper's Hawks were often observed.

After finishing here, we walked up onto Timber Hill, with its great stand of mature Douglas Fir (far fewer trees today), Oak and Laurel. Here we would find Acorn Woodpecker, Steller's Jay (fall and over winter at that time), Hermit Thrush, Goldencrowned Kinglet, American Creeper, Northern Flicker, Pacific Flycatcher, Western Wood Peewee (in summer), White-breasted Nuthatch, and Cedar Waxwing. A Northern Mockingbird was usually near the house.

For two winters, a Saw-whet Owl wintered on the limb of a Laurel tree, giving its presence away by its white droppings on the ground.

Usually our day of birding in this area produced a list approaching or slightly over 100 species. If we passed the 100 mark, Gordy would always say, "Now we're in the gravy."


