

Monthly Meeting, April 13, 2016:

Gordon Beebe, President of Madrone Audubon Society, will present "Three weeks in the Ecuadorian Andes, from east to west". Experience the visual beauty and unique songs and calls of the birds of the varied mountain habitats of Ecuador, said to have the highest biodiversity per acre of any country in the world. Not to be outdone, the variety of caterpillars and butterflies encountered rival any bird species seen.

Gordon Beebe is a project coordinator for the Sonoma County Breeding Bird Atlas, the Saturday bird walk leader and website editor for Madrone Audubon. He

DINNER BEFORE MEETING: Join us at 5:30 p.m., at **Mary's Pizza Shack**, 535 Summerfield Rd., Santa Rosa, across from Howarth Park. From Hwy. 101 take Hwy. 12 east. Turn left on Farmer's Ln., right on Montgomery Dr. and right on Summerfield Rd. Mary's will be on your right. They do not accept reservations for groups smaller than 15, so when you arrive just ask to be seated with the RROS birders' group in the back room.

FIELD TRIPS -

Saturday, April 9, 2016: Field Trip to the Pope Valley area of Napa County. Leader: Ruth Rudesill (707-833-6026 or ruthier@sonic.net). Meet at 8 AM at the corner of Hwy 128 and Silverado Trail, Napa Valley. We will bird the south end of Lake Hennessey (bathroom stop at boat launch,) and then travel to Pope Valley, where we will bird the Cedar Roughs Wildlife Area and local farm ponds. Then to the north end of Lake Berryessa for lunch. In early afternoon, hit Knoxville Rd for possible Lewis's Woodpeckers. Other possibles: Hooded Merganser, waterfowl and grebes, Bald Eagles and otters. Bring lunch and money for parking. Heavy rain cancels.

Saturday, April 23, 2016: King Ridge Road. Leader is Bill Doyle (shortbill@comcast.net). Meet at the bakery on the south side of Hwy 116 in Duncan's Mills at 8 a.m. This is a great spring trip which should have some nice wildflowers. We'll be on the lookout for all land birds. Possible highlights are American Dipper, Mountain Quail, and Sooty Grouse. Bring lunch, snacks, optics, sunscreen, layers, hats. We will carpool from Duncan's Mills. Heavy rain cancels.

Saturday, May 14, 2016: Pine Flat Road. Leader TBA. This is is our last local field trip of the season. Pine Flat Road has wonderful rare wildflowers, great butterflies, and terrific birds. All the spring nesting species should be in. Meet 8 a.m. at Pine Flat Road past the Jimtown store, where the road narrows, at the bridge. From Hwy 101, take Dry Creek exit to Healdsburg Av., to Alexander Valley Road, to Pine Flat Road. Bring optics, field guides, water, lunch, sunscreen, hats. Heavy rain cancels

Special Memorial Weekend Fieldtrip to Inyo and Mono Counties -

Friday, May 27 through Monday, May 30, 2016: We will stay in Bishop, a 7 hour drive from Santa Rosa, on Friday and Saturday nights, and in Lee Vining Sunday night, at tobe-designated motels. Camping is also an option. Bishop is at 4000 feet elevation, at the head of the Owens River Valley, sandwiched between the towering summits (to 14,000 feet) of the eastern Sierra Nevada and the White Mountains. The valley floor varies from pasture, to wetlands, to high desert shrub steppe. The valleys cut into the Sierras lead along tumbling streams, through forests of pinyon, juniper, and Jeffrey pine, up to Lodgepole Pine and White Fir at roads end. Wildflowers abound. East from Big Pine, just down 6 & 395 from Bishop, the road climbs up to Westgard Pass, from which we will climb to the Bristlecone Pine groves, at 11,000 feet on the White Mountain crest. We will enjoy stunning vistas west to the High Sierras. From Westgard Pass we drop east into the Deep Springs Valley. Deep Springs College and the Fish Lake Valley are oases that are magnets for vagrants in late May. On the west side of the Deep Spring Valley is Wyman Canyon, draining east from high in the White Mountains. Rare California nesting species may be found here, such as Broad-tailed Hummingbird, Plumbeous Vireo, Virginia's Warbler. Juniper Titmouse, and the Gray-headed race of the Dark-eyed Junco. Sunday we will drive north again, to Lee Vining, overlooking Mono Lake. Monday morning, we'll explore the ghost town of Bodie for possible Sage Grouse, and Pinyon Jay, before heading home. Arrive Thursday night if possible. Stay tuned for additional details. Contact Gene Hunn at enhunn323@comcast.net or 707-981-7301.

Sunday, August 14, 2016: High Summer Pelagic Join RROS on an "early season" pelagic trip to Bodega Canyon and Cordell Bank. Later in summer we get bigger numbers of the usual species, but August offers a better chance for rarities. Think about South Pacific Albatrosses, Pterodroma Petrels, Wedge-rumped Storm-Petrels and Frigatebirds. Rare birds indeed, but you sure won't see them from shore. PISHING WITH PARMETER- SOUTHERN COLUMBIA, 1975

In July, 1975, Gordie Bolander, John Parmeter, and myself were fortunate to be invited by Dr. Van Remsen on a 4 week birding tour of Columbia. Van was finishing up his doctoral studies of the Neotropical Kingfishers in South America. He is now a distinguished ornithologist, Professor of Zoology at LSU, curator of the Natural History Museum at that institution, and chairman of the South American Checklist Committee. There were ten of us in the group. Gordie, John, and I arrived in Cali in southern Columbia, in the Cauca Valley between the West and Central Andes, on July 4th. We proceeded into the city by taxi, where the 3 of us from Sonoma County were to meet the others at the Aristi Hotel. On the way into town, we crossed a heavily wooded stream and talked the driver into stopping for a few minutes. We were very fortunate to locate Dwarf Cuckoos! The following day our entire group returned to observe this species.

Our first full day was spent at West Crest, a few miles west of Cali. Highlights that day included: Southern Lapwing, Shiny Catbird, Wattled Jacana, Ruddy-winged Flycatcher, Blue-and-White Swallow, Flame-rumped Tanager, Spectacled Parrolet, Ruddy-breasted Seedeater, Dark-billed Cuckoo, Rieffer's Hummingbird, Gray Seedeater, Pied Water-Tyrant, Pale-breasted Spinetail, and, at day's end, back to the Dwarf Cuckoo.

We returned to the same area the next day, adding these lifers: Azara's Spinetail, Metallic-green Tanager, Three-striped Warbler, Red-faced Spinetail, Golden Tanager, Oleaginous Hemispingus, Speckled Hummingbird, Streak-necked Flycatcher, Black-billed Robin, Saffron-crowned Tanager, Beryl-spangled Tanager, Booted Racket-tail Hummingbird, Glossy-backed Thrush, Golden-naped Tanager, Multicolored Tanager, Olivaceous Piculet, Bronzy Inca, Yellow-billed Siskin (same genus as our siskin), Green Honeycreeper, Bayheaded Tanager, Streaked Saltator, Orange-bellied Euphonia, Andean Solitaire (same genus as ours), Crimson-rumped Toucanet, Greenish Puffleg Hummingbird, Scrub Tanager, Crested Quetzal, Ash-throated Bush Tanager, Blue-winged Mountain-tanager, Chestnut-crowned Ant Pitta, Yellow-faced Grassquit, and Chestnut-breasted Wren.

Quite a list for 2 days; all lifers! It was raining one of the days, and we missed breakfast. An inn owner opened his restaurant for us, serving us bacon and eggs. A wonderful meal! That evening we had dinner at the Aristi Hotel while working on the day list.

The trip continued in this fashion, with lots of lifers every day. We spent 10 days in the Andes, then flew to Leticia on the Amazon, spending another two weeks there. More to follow....... Mike~
