PISHING with PARMETER

NEW GUINEA: TARI VALLEY AND AMBUA LODGE

We flew from Karawari Lodge to Tari valley. I was told that no westerner had been in the valley until 1937. It is located in the central highlands at an elevation

of approximately 4000 feet. After landing we proceeded over a very rough road to Ambua Lodge. This was a beautiful place located right in the rainforest. The lodge was roomy with a very nice dining room, a social room, and a drink counter. The gardens were impeccably cared for and contained many native plants. There were scattered huts which served as guest rooms. Birding on the lodge grounds was excellent.

Our first birding was in the valley, where we recorded Great Wood-Swallow, Yellow-browed Melidectes, Rufous-backed Honeyeater, Slater's Whistler, Red-collared Myzomela, Friendly Fantail, Lawes's Parotia (a bird of paradise), Buff-faced Scrubwren, Oriental Hobby, and Glossy Swiftlet.

At Ambua Lodge we observed King-of-Saxony Bird of Paradise, quite a bird with two long plumes coming out the back of its head. We also saw Belford's Melidectes, Black-breasted Boatbill (a flycatcher), Blue-capped Ifrita (acts like a creeper), Black-throated Robin, Mountain Swiftlet, Ribbon-tailed Astrapia (another bird of paradise), Loria's Bird of Paradise, Mountain Firetail (a finch), Brown Quail, Regent Whistler, Wattled Ploughbill, Brehm's Tiger-Parrot, and Large Scrubwren.

The following day we birded along a dirt road which went north through the wet forest. Birds here included Whitebreasted Fruit-Dove, Yellow-billed Parakeet, Papuan Lorikeet, Papuan Treecreeper, Tit Berrypecker, Black-throated Honeyeater, Tawny Grassbird, Canary Flycatcher, Short-tailed Paradigalla (a bird of paradise), Plum-faced Lorikeet, Blue-gray Robin, Madarasz's Tiger-Parrot, Black Fantail, Papuan King Parrot, Mountain Berrypecker, and Orange-billed Lorikeet. The following day we went farther up the hill into some open grassland. This provided quite a vista of the central highlands. We saw Dimorphic Fantail, Crested Berrypecker, Mountain Mouse Warbler, Superb Bird of Paradise, and Crested Bird of Paradise. We then crowded into the forest in a brushy area, hoping to call in a Chestnut-fronted Rail. Despite the noise we made, the rail responded to a tape and promptly appeared. Also seen here were White-winged Robin and Hooded Cuckooshrike.

On the third day we went back down into the Tari Valley. The highlight of this trip was the **Blue Bird of Paradise**, one of the handsomest members of the family. Both a male and a female were seen. Other species noted were **Pygmy Honeyeater, Mountain Meliphaga,** and **Mountain Leaf Warbler**.

The following day we were back up at Ambua Lodge, observing Island Thrush, Macgregor's Bowerbird, Princess Stephanie's Astrapia (another bird of paradise), Loria's Bird of Paradise, Black-billed Cuckooshrike, Lesser Melampitta (at that time classified as a bird of paradise, but now in a separate family), Papuan Logrunner, Black Sitella, Mountain Firetail, and Papuan Boobook (an owl).

We flew back to Port Moresby via Mount Hagen. Our final day of birding was spent back at Virarita National Park, where we saw **Spotted Whistling-Duck, Rusty Mountain Warbler, Pale-billed Scrubwren**, and **Black Myzomela**. At the airport before leaving we spotted an **Australian Pratincole**.

The birding was so spectacular that I hated to leave. We saw 315 bird taxa, of which 185 were new for me. I had been concerned about accommodations, but all were excellent, and I got few insect bites.

FIELD TRIP REPORT

RROS Field Trip report - October 5th, 2019 - Pt. Reyes NS It was a fantastic day for weather - which usually means not so good for vagrants. Eight birders participated (with two others tagging along from Virginia and Ireland!) We observed about 85 species. We had good numbers of **Townsend's Warblers** at every spot including a dozen at the Inverness Tennis Court. Lots of **Red-breasted Nuthatches** at outer point. **Golden-crowned Kinglets** and a **Blue-gray Gnatcatcher** as well as a cooperative **Great Horned Owl**. And excellent photo opportunities.

"Red-breasted Nuthatches in our backyard have been very common this winter. The Red-breasted Nuthatch is an irruptive species, with obvious southward movements occurring in alternate years. Typically, the populations that breed the farthest north are the ones most likely to migrate on an annual basis, while the birds that breed further south may be resident year-round in non-irruptive years (Ghalambor and Martin 1999). Southward irruptions in Red-breasted Nuthatches have been linked to an inadequate supply of winter food due to poor cone crop production. It is not known to what extent climate affects the cone crop production on an annual basis. Info from PRBO."
