

March Virtual Membership Meeting: Wednesday, March 10th via Zoom, 7 pm

This month's presentation will be streamed live to all members with internet access. Streaming via Zoom will allow virtual attendance for many who otherwise could not attend in person, even pre-COVID!

This month's virtual program: "Tierra de Aves Banding Program" with Manuel Grosselet



Manuel Grosselet, director of Tierra de Aves, in Oaxaca, Mexico, will inform us about his banding program in several locations

About the speaker: An ornithologist by training, Manuel has participated in numerous bird monitoring programs since 1988 in Europe, North Africa and North and Central America. Over the last two decades, he has monitored birds in the Santo Domingo Botanical Garden in the Mexican city of Oaxaca. He has worked as sub-director in the Federal Environmental Law Enforcement Agency and in the Division of Wildlife of SEMARNAT. He teaches courses on bird identification through sight and sound in France and Mexico, courses on use of mist-nets, bird banding, and molt in various parts of North America. He is author of a photographic guide to Oaxacan birds, Aves de Oaxaca (2003).

In January 2019 he led a group from RROS on a tour of Oaxaca and invited us to join his team for a banding session at the Santo Domingo garden in Oaxaca. RROS supports his banding efforts with a small annual donation. For more info on Tierra de Aves visit http://www.tierradeaves.com/

TO "JOIN" THE ZOOM MEETING

- I) click on the "Join Zoom Meeting" link provided in the email sent by RROS. To protect the security of the meeting, this link will not be posted on the RROS website. The meeting is open to both RROS members and non-members. A non-member MUST contact Anne O'Donnell (auodonnell@gmail.com) to "register" their email contact info for the meeting (will be used ONLY for the purpose of verifying a friendly person).
- 2) Follow the prompts to download and run ZOOM and/or to ensure that you have the current version of the ZOOM app.
- 3) Enter the meeting ID NUMBER*, if prompted. Enter the PASSCODE*, if prompted.
- 4) Click to "join the audio conference". Once in the meeting, you may click on the "START VIDEO" or "JOIN VIDEO" button to Zoom yourself into the conference.
- 5) Once the presentation starts, please select the "mute" button to block audio from your station. At any time during and/ or at the conclusion of the presentation, click on the "CHAT" button at the bottom of the screen to type in any comments or questions.

Trouble Shooting:

If the presenter and slides are blocked by the "windows" of other participants, click on "hide video panel", on the TOP RIGHT of your screen.

If you find that you've reached the "waiting room" and can't get into the meeting, or if you've been dropped from the meeting, PLEASE contact Rob O'Donnell, identify yourself and we'll try to make sure you can join.

April 10, 2021, Pine Flat Road 🗏 👑 🗓



YAMS Field Trip Report – Bodega Bay, February 6, 2021

On February 6th, the RROS Youth Group, the Young Ancient Murrelets (or YAMS), birded together at Bodega Bay. Youth participants were Bea Pezzolo, Clayton Rucker, Aubrey Phipps, and Johnny Urbauski. Quite a few parents also participated.

We started out at Port o Bodega. We had a nice variety of ducks, loons, and grebes. We spent some time studying eared and horned grebes and admiring a few **Common Goldeneyes**.

We then drive over to Doran Beach. The tides were perfect for shorebirding and the weather was perfect. One of our first birds seen was the **Pacific Golden Plover** found earlier in the week by Ron Story. There was a wonderful assortment of shorebirds including many **Snowy Plovers** on the harbor side to feed on the invertebrates that were beginning to be exposed by the falling tide.

One magical moment on the mudflats was when a mysterious masked birder appeared next to Tony Pezzolo told him that there was a **Bonaparte's Gull** in he flock of gulls in front of us. Sure enough there was a Bonaparte's Gull hiding in the back of the gull flock. This was comical because Tony has been bugging

the last few field trips to find him a Bonaparte's Gull. He really, really wanted to see a Bonaparte's Gull for a long time.

When we drove to the end of the spit, the park had become so crowded that it was challenging to find enough parking spaces for the group. In fact I parked on some iceplant and we briefly looked out over the jetty and ocean. I arrived back at my car just as the Ranger had his pen to his ticket tablet. Phew! That was a close one!

We then drove around to Bodega Head. The **Pelagic and Brandt's Cormorants** were all dressed up in their breeding plumage. And of course, the **Black Oystercatchers** were showing off.

We ended the trip at Campbell Cove. A **Peregrine Falcon** flew over us just as we were finishing our bird list for the day!

PISHING with PARMETER

MONKEY ISLAND (near Leticia, Colombia): JULY 15, 1975

On the morning of 15 July we birded in the rainforest near Leticia. I added several species to my life list: **Spot-**

breasted Woodpecker, Tui Parakeet, Mouse-colored Tyrannulet, Spotted Tody-Flycatcher, Yellow-tufted Woodpecker, White-vented Euphonia, Glittering-throated Emerald (a hummingbird), Yellow-crowned Tyrannulet, and Turquoise Tanager.

Dr. Van Remsen, our leader, who had spent considerable time at Leticia while he worked on his doctoral thesis, told us he had never gone birding at Leticia without seeing at least one or two life birds. He had prepared a list of possible species to be seen here, which came to over 700 birds. It is something of an understatement to say that the Amazon is rich in bird life.

We continued birding until lunchtime, adding Ochrebellied Flycatcher, Black-bellied Cuckoo, Plain-

brown Woodcreeper, Paradise Jacamar, Magpie Tanager, Black-spotted Barbet, Streaked Flycatcher, Crowned Slaty Flycatcher, Southern Beardless-Tyrannulet, and Red-stained Woodpecker.

During the morning I saw 19 lifers. We had lunch at the motel where we were staying. After lunch we loaded into a motor boat and headed upstream on the Amazon to Monkey Island, arriving after a trip of 45 minutes. This was a permanent island in the river, with very basic housing facilities.

That afternoon we birded on the island, adding several species to the trip list: Yellow-billed Tern, Plumbeous Kite, Short-tailed Parrot, Troupial (an oriole), Red-capped Cardinal, Horned Screamer, Drab Water-Tyrant (what a name!), Brown-chested Martin, Red-belled Macaw, White-necked Heron, Oriole Blackbird, and Greater Ani — all new for me. We ended the day with dinner, sleeping on the island. This was to be our base for birding over the next few days.
