Continuing our quest for seasonal vagrants, we will scour the environs of Bodega Bay. Dan Nelson will lead us. October 10, 2020, Sugar Loaf Ridge State Park , 5:45AM-10:00AM

Early morning owling along the entrance road to Sugar Loaf Ridge State Park. Possible Northern Spotted Owl, Long-eared Owl, or Saw-whet Owl. Probable Northern Pygmy-Owl and Western Screech-Owl. Ruthie Rudesill will lead us. Ruthie has some of the best "bird ears" in the County and great knowledge of owl calls.

Owling is about hearing the birds, so please wear quiet clothing—nothing that makes noise when you move. Carpooling is not required, and not prohibited—your discretion After sunrise (7:15AM), those who wish to, may join us birding the Meadow/Hillside trails loop. Sugar Loaf requires a \$10 parking fee (\$8 senior) or annual pass.

October 24, 2020 , Willow Creek Road - Jenner , 8:00 am- Noon



Join Teresa and Miles Tuffli for a morning of birding along Willow Creek Road in Jenner. During raptor migration season, we'll have the potential for multiple species - Ferruginous Hawks, American Kestrels, Bald Eagles, and more. Many wintering and year-round passerines will be frequenting the willows, alders, and scrub. With a view of the Russian River, we'll look for some water birds as well.

We'll meet at Russian House #1 restaurant, and bird the road's entrance on foot. We'll then move all cars down the road to a large pullout. We'll bird the willows, creek area, and river view on foot before continuing down the road, stopping to bird various sections. No bathrooms. Heavy rain cancels. We'll bird the north shore of San Pablo Bay, south of Highway 37. Gene Hunn will lead us checking out the large concentrations of raptors, shorebirds and other waterfowl. We will check the abandoned docks for Ridgway's Rail and the mouth of the Petaluma River for shorebirds and waterfowl before heading east to Reclamation Road, the Tubbs Island trail near the mouth of Tolay Creek, and the wetlands at the Skaggs Island spur off Highway 37. Finish by 1:00PM.

Field Trip Report: Fresno June 2020

A crew of stir crazy RROS members made a break from the places in which they'd been sheltering the first weekend in June, heading for the hills of Fresno County. The trip had been planned pre-Covid by Ruthie, but she couldn't get away from work, so Peter took over. Officially everything was just as closed as it's been for months, internet providing lots of conflicting information. Luckily his access died a couple days prior to departure, so he left instructions to meet at the chosen campground of Midge Creek and away he bailed. Luckily those better connected, particularly Bob Hasenick, persevered and talked the manager of The Cedars into taking most of the group in.

Friday opened at Midge Creek at First Birdable Light, where Gene offered to lead the group around the Lakeshore Campground at Huntington Lake, and so we returned there. Better birds included Spotted Sandpiper, MacGillvray's Warbler, Lincoln's Sparrow and White-headed Woodpecker. We then continued around

the north Shore to Ruthie's Meadow, picking up House Wren and Golden-crowned Kinglet. Next we circled back around the lake and descended ultimately to Big Creek, finding Olive-sided Flycatcher, seeing Mountain Quail, Calliope Hummer, Lazuli Bunting, Pewee, Gnatcatcher and BTG-Warbler. Last stop was back up at Camp Keola, finding Hermit Warbler and Dusky Flycatcher.

Saturday we took the drive to Florence Lake, stopping first at a meadow Julie had cased out, and next up to Kaiser Summit, which was good for Cassin's Finch and Siskins. The drive to Florence Lake is through lots of bare granite and big bonsai junipers and struggling pines, the kind of place you normally have to hike long distances to. We found Cassin's Vireo and White-throated Swifts en route to Jackass Meadow. Over 3 hours was spent at the meadow with Warbling Vireo, Black-chinned Hummingbird, nesting Dippers and Rock Wren, and good looks at a Willow Flycatcher. Later at Florence Lake we found nothing new,

but it was so beautiful. On our return we dawdled at Kaiser Pass area, finding Hammond's Flycatcher and Williamson's Sapsucker. That evening The Hunn serenaded some of us fireside with Leadbelly songs.

Sunday morning we broke camp and descended to Swanson Meadow near Lake Shaver, good for such birds as Pac-Slope Flycatcher, Purple Finch and Hutton's Vireo. Next Ruthie led us to finish at McKinley Sequoia Grove, where there were lots of newly fledged Pacific Wrens and a Pileated Woodpecker which called out to bid us all adieu.

PISHING with PARMETER

CERRO MUNCHIQUE: SUMMER 1974

In the summer of 1974 I spent three and a half weeks birding in Colombia, South

America. The trip was led by Van Remsen, who was completing his doctoral thesis on New World kingfishers. There are only six species of kingfishers in the western hemisphere, five of which are resident in the Amazon Basin where he carried out his research. Van had invited a group of ten birders from the Bay Area to join him on a birding trip to western and Amazonian Colombia. Gordon Bolander, John Parmeter, and I were part of that group. We met in Cali, a city in southwestern Colombia, on 4 July 1975.

One of the sites we visited was Cerro Munchique on the eastern slope of the western Andes (the Andes divide into three parallel north-south ranges in Colombia). It was quite a day of birding, starting at 6:00 AM and continuing until dark.

Among the many species encountered were Bluewinged Mountain-Tanager, Blue-and-black Tanager, White-sided Flowerpiercer, Great Thrush, Lacri-

mose Mountain-Tanager (so named due to the white spots on its face resembling tears), Rufousnaped Brush-Finch, Sierran Elaenia, Grass-green Tanager, Flammulated Treehunter, Brown-bellied Swallow, Band-tailed Pigeon (same species as in North America), Yellow-breasted Chat-Tyrant (a flycatcher), Chestnut-collared Swift (which I had seen previously in Mexico), White-collared Swift, Tourmaline Sunangel (a hummingbird), Paraque (same species found in south Texas), Handsome Flycatcher, Rufous Spinetail, Andean Emerald (another hummingbird), and Blue-capped Tanager.

We had a picnic lunch and quickly got back to birding. Species added in the afternoon were Tyrian Metaltail (a hummingbird), Gray-hooded Bush-Tanager, Golden-fronted Redstart, Red-backed Hawk (now considered a form of Variable Hawk), Pearled Treerunner (a very pretty bird), Green-fronted Lancebill, Blue-headed Sapphire, and White-bellied Woodstar (these last three all hummingbirds).

I ended the day with 26 lifers. If I had not kept notes I certainly could not remember them!

BACKYARD BIRDING: an alternative to field trips, part 2

As we move on to the Fall season of bird watching, still hampered by some coronavirus restrictions, although relaxed to the extent that we are able to visit our county and regional parks, we begin to notice that many avian specie are (or already have) made their migration back to Sonoma County. On the other hand many year-round species continue to visit people's backyards.

Birders, especially those with physical mobility or transportation problems can still enjoy backyard birding. This is the time to set out and stock up those bird feeders.



This pair of Hooded Orioles have been visiting my feeder for several years in a row. I have many shots of them individually at the feeder but this one of both together taken back in March is rare for me.



Unlike the Golden Crowned Sparrows which will forage out in the open for minutes on end, the Towhee grabs a quick seed and vanishes back into the bushes. This species is a frequent visitor to my backyard.



When certain berries ripen one can often expect flocks of Cedar Waxwings and Robins eating them. It's a treat to see them eat and quench their thirst time and again at the birdbath. At the birdbath the Waxwings can be heard to protest the Robin's presence with high sree or tsee notes.



Nectar feeders are for hummingbirds and orioles, right? So what is this House Finch doing at the feeder? There's a birdbath only a few feet away. Maybe it needs its sugar high too.
